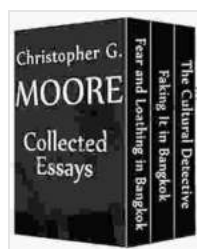


# The Cultural Detective's Faking It in Bangkok: Fear and Loathing in the Land of Smiles

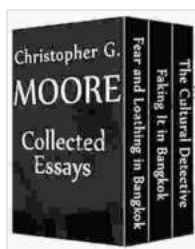

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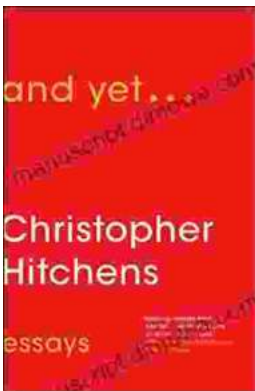
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
